From the biggest revolt of the Guinean population against the military regime in 2007, through the coup d'etat in 2009, to the first "democratic" election in the country, in June 2010. Four years of big changes that describe one population held in a deadly grip, that fights and struggles in front of the tacit consent of the international community.
